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
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EVERY MUSIC TEACHER A LEADER

Have you ever heard the story of *The Three Little Wolves and the Big Bad Pig* by Eugene Trivizas?

Once upon a time, there were three little wolves who had to go out into the world to build a house for themselves. They were told to beware of the big bad pig. One day, they met a kangaroo who gave them some bricks and they built a house of bricks. The very next day, the big bad pig came along and knocked on the door. When the wolves refused to let him in, he went to fetch a sledgehammer and knocked the house down. The wolves managed to escape before the bricks crumbled.

The wolves decided to build a stronger house and acquired some concrete from a beaver, with which they built a house of concrete. Unfortunately, the big bad pig came, fetched his pneumatic drill and smashed the house down. Once again, the three wolves managed to escape, trembling with fear.

The wolves decided to build an even stronger house. This new house was their strongest yet, with barbed wires, iron bars, armour plates and heavy metal padlocks they received from a rhinoceros. They felt absolutely safe. However, the big bad pig came yet again, brought some dynamite and blew up the house. Thankfully, the three wolves managed to escape, albeit with their tails scorched.

The wolves decided that something must be wrong with their building materials and began to try something different. They built a house with flowers they received from a flamingo. It was a rather fragile house and it swayed in the wind but it was most beautiful. The next day, the big bad pig came and wanted to blow the house down. But as he took a deep breath, he smelled the soft scent of the flowers and began sniffing the fragrant scent instead. His heart grew tender and he decided to become a big good pig. The wolves realised that the pig had changed and invited him into the house. They all lived happily ever after.

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Now, what has this story got to do with teacher leadership?

First, there was the perseverance and innovation of the wolves. There was a constant drive to think critically and improve on their building design, and to draw from others' help. Second, it was also about thinking from the opposite perspective, and not necessarily having the most powerful resources to be successful. Third, it is about humanity, creating a beautiful masterpiece, loving and projecting light onto others.

In our own classes and our work, we might encounter a "big bad pig" that seeks to destroy and presents challenges. However, collaboratively, we could design and create different innovative solutions and lead change.

This year, we welcome a total of 29 Secondary and 57 Primary STAR Champions (Music) appointed by their Superintendents to lead their respective cluster music teachers. We also have 14 Music teacher-researchers appointed to conduct arts pedagogical research, with their findings to be published and shared with our fraternity. 18 of our experienced teachers have also opened their classes to Beginning Teachers (BTs) so that BTs have the opportunity to gain new insights into routines and scaffolding in Music lessons. We are also glad that teachers have stepped forward and offered to lead Communities of Practice and as STAR Associates. In various formal and informal capacities, each of us can *lead*, *care and inspire* change, and collectively we can grow as a fraternity.

A PERSPECTIVE ON TEACHERLEADERSHIP

Never crossed my mind. Probably I viewed 'leader' with a narrow understanding, reserved for the very experienced and highly respected teachers.

However, I became more open to that thought as I reflected about the work I do and also of the teachers whom I work with in the East Zone Centre of Excellence for the Creative Arts (EZCOECA) – Music Satellite Committee and in the STAR Champions programme. I realised we are all indeed teacher-leaders in our own small ways, championing our hopes for the students we teach, coming together to join forces and spurring each other on. After all, isn't that what we all hope to achieve as teachers? To impact our students and to reach out to others in our teaching community, so that they will in turn carry on the good work and impact more students.

Here are two areas of work and interaction with other music teachers that have inspired me to lead in my own small way and, in return, helped me learn.

East Zone Centre of Excellence for the Creative Arts – Music Satellite

Led by Mrs Kimberley Sng (Anglican High School) and I, we work with a dedicated team of 13 teachers in the East Zone, organising and conducting programmes for Primary and Secondary students and teachers. Some events are:

- 1 EZ Music Warriors, a station-game format competition for Primary students.
- 2 EZ Music Competition with solo piano, voice, violin, and ensemble categories, alternating between Primary and Secondary each year.
- 3 EZ 'O' Level Music Special Programmes with composition and Asian Music workshops, music activities, and a Values-in-Action (VIA) component, for 'O' Level Music students in the East Zone.
- 4 EZ N(T) Music Special Programme with workshops and activities for N(T) Music students.
- 5 EZ Music Teacher Sharing Session for Secondary teachers.

Through these programmes, students have the opportunity to learn and to showcase their abilities. Teachers also get to work collaboratively in planning and organising events. We are motivated to continue this good work as we remember and are grateful for the work started by our predecessors who were themselves teacher-leaders, who inspired us to be teacher-leaders within our own capacity and to continue carrying the torch for student learning.

STAR Champions Programme

My experience in the STAR Champions programme last year was fruitful. Before conducting a session for our cluster teachers, we first attended workshops and lesson demonstrations, engaged in discussions, and submitted a video lesson for feedback. I was most touched when I received feedback and practical suggestions on my video lesson. It was useful in developing my understanding of student centricity as it made me reflect on my teaching approaches and learn to be a better music teacher.

I have learnt not to be daunted but to embrace being a teacher-leader within my own capacity. Having said that, I am also convinced that a teacher-leader's work is not just the lonely work of one teacher but the collective efforts of teacher-leaders, which has the potential to cascade to and impact even more students, allowing them to have a meaningful learning experience in the arts.



THE ROLE OF A MASTER TEACHER

Have you ever wondered about the roles and responsibilities of a Master Teacher in Music?

A work week for our newly-appointed Master Teacher in Music, Mdm Suriati Suradi, involves the coaching of untrained music teachers in the Music Teacher Practitioner Programme, mentoring and guiding of beginning music teachers, and leading music teachers and key personnel on music pedagogies.

As a pedagogical leader, a Master Teacher builds the quality of music teaching and learning across schools. The MTT models and champions the way for other music teachers in the fraternity by engaging in the professional development of other music teachers.

Dalcroze Eurhythmics – Learning By Experiencing

In Dalcroze eurhythmics, students are given the opportunity to experience music in their whole being. There is potential for students to go beyond theoretical knowledge of music concepts in such an approach. They develop deeper and enduring understanding. Our primary music teachers and 'O' Level music teachers learnt about eurhythmics and solfège from Dalcroze pedagogue John R. Stevenson. They also developed keyboard improvisation skills to implement the Dalcroze approach in their classrooms. Teacher participants' experience at the workshops and demonstration classes led them to rethink their approach to student-centric music lessons. We share some of their thoughts here:
