Does practice makes perfect?

Music is a practice-based discipline. As music teachers, in addition to classroom teaching, some of us also advise our students on how to optimise the practice time for their instruments. The adage is, "practice makes perfect". Or does it?

How about seeing practice from another perspective: 'Amateurs practise until they get it right; professionals practise until they never get it wrong.' Like a professional tennis player who needs to constantly keep his level of fitness, so must musicians continue to keep their instrumental skills sharp too. How do we help our students keep practising at the heart of their daily routine?

For a start, we could help students set challenging and yet attainable goals, organising their practice sessions to reach these personal goals. But does it mean that more practice sessions they have, the faster one could reach the goals?

Gary Marcus, a cognitive psychologist at New York University, in his book *Guitar Zero: The New Musician and the Science of Learning* mentions the importance of doing practice right – **deliberate practice**. It is about self-evaluating and focusing on one's weaknesses. Studies show that practice aimed at remedying weaknesses will enable one to efficiently reach a new level of better expertise than endless hours of daily practice and repeating what one already knows.

Another cognitive psychologist Anders Ericsson's echoes the same view. Deliberate practice requires focusing inventing new ways to root out errors. At the end of the day,

"It's not how much you practice but whether you're quick to fix your errors that leads to mastery."

- Ericsson in The role of deliberate practice in the acquisition of expert performance (1993)
