Semoga Bahagia: Singapore Children's Day, 50 Years On

We celebrate Singapore's 50th Children's Day this October! Singapore's first ever Children's Day celebration in our schools took place on Monday, 23 October 1961. This day was in keeping with the United Nation's Children's Day, which was then, designated on 22 October. As it fell on a Sunday that year, our schools celebrated on the following day.

According to the Straits Times, 4 August 1961, 37,000 children would be celebrating the day with a Children's Day song. The song, composed by Zubir Said for the occasion, would be sung during school assembly. After the singing of the Children's Day song, principals would deliver a special message from the then Minister for Education, Mr Yong Nyuk Lin. It was suggested that schools present awards to their pupils for acts of gallantry and outstanding achievements and organised concerts, talentime, debates or film shows on that day.

50 years on today, while our celebration formats have changed, the evergreen *Semoga Bahagia* remains a focal point in many of our celebrations, giving the day its symbolic significance and tradition. The song's lyrics, focusing on personal values, still ring true and relevant today, perhaps even more so in today's environment (see translation here: <u>http://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Semoga_Bahagia</u>). It is amazing to see how music can 'embody' and pass down the meanings of special occasions like this one.

While we are busy preparing for the celebrations, let us remember the reason for the day, the meaning of the song. We share with you a quote from the United Nations, the originator of this special day dedicated to all children around the world:

We were all children once. And we all share the desire for the well-being of our children, which has always been and will continue to be the most universally cherished aspiration of humankind. -- from We the Children: End-decade review of the follow-up to the World Summit for Children, Report of the Secretary-General (2001)
